




EDUCATION

According to the constitution of India, the government is to provide free and compulsory education to all children below 14 years. 'Education for All' is a historic step taken by the Government of India by enforcing 'The Right to Education Act', which brings the country closer to achieving the objectives and mission of the Millennium Development Goals. The Seb's Education programme is part of the global inititative to bring children who are vulnerable to migration, child labour and illiteracy to a place of freedom and dignity, a place of learning and sharing, a place of wholeness and development.

Seb's educational initiatives vary from running pre-schools to primary and middle schools. They have enabled children from the tribal communities to have easy access to education and open windows of opportunities for their future. Children follow the state government syllabus and appear for exams. Regular monitoring and supervision and home visits along with dedicated, highly motivated teachers make learning a reality for these children.



Highlights

- Today every child of school-going age in the tribal villages we are working in attends a Seb's school, reaching out to 290 students
- 71 children between the ages of 2 and 4 attend the Balwadi/child care centres, and nine of the little ones have been enrolled in Std.1 in Seb's school.
- 110 children have graduated to middle/high and higher secondary levels.
- 43 students have been enrolled in the new tribal primary school at Thaniyamarathur
- · We started a tribal school with 40 students in Panangkateri.
- All students are provided with textbooks and notebooks. This has significantly improved the teaching and participation of children in the classroom activities.
- The performance of Seb's School students was rated far above the level of the state government schools in Tamil Nadu based on the Annual Status of Education Report (ASER)
- Over 250 children participated in a week long summer camp which was held in all of the school villages. This was time for fun and creative activities.
- The improvement in school attendance has resulted in fewer children being forced to work and being trafficked.
- The schools have brought communities together to discuss and address other community issues that affect their lives.

When Vennila was born, her father was involved in illegal tree logging to earn a living. He was shot and killed by forest officials in a violent encounter.




Her widowed mother had to send away Vennila's two older siblings to work in the neighbouring states as daily wage labourers. Today, Vennila is 8 years old and a star student in year 3 at the Thaniyamarthur school. Her siblings are now back in the village, much to the delight of her mother.

SPORTS

Sports continues to be a huge attraction in our tribal schools and sufficient sports materials are made available in all our schools. Each community has greatly appreciated and benefited from the sports education. The Seb's Interschool Annual Sports Meet was organized, in which 290 children from seven different villages performed a mass drill, a march past, tournaments and athletic events, cheered on by community members. It also made each of our schools situated in remote areas feel a sense of oneness and belonging in being part of Seb's School in the Jawadhi Hills.

Highlights

- The sports programme encourages children to attend school regularly.
- Initially sports in tribal communities were rough and tough. Today children play games understanding the rules of the game in the true spirit of sportsmanship.



HIGHER EDUCATION SCHOLARSHIP

Every tribal child that graduates from Seb's school is supported and mentored through secondary school and into college through our scholarship program. Tie-ups with philanthropisits have enabled young girls and boys to fulfil their dreams of higher education through the Seb's scholarship program. Students belong to economically weaker sections of society, whose families are largely illiterate and usually have only one earning member.

Highlights

- 110 students have support for middle and high school education.
- · Five young women are pursuing a nursing course.

· Seven students were supported for their higher education in college and two of them are pursuing engineering courses.


HEALTH

Health is invariably a neglected issue amongst the tribal communities in the Jawadhi Hills. They live in poor hygienic conditions, have poor nutrition and cultivate unhealthy practices, all of which makes them susceptible to various health conditions. An improvement in the health status has been effected in all twenty hamlets where Seb's has a presence in Jawadhi Hills.

The first step in addressing health needs was to help improve the health-seeking behaviour of individuals and the community as a whole. Less than 20% of children were fully immunized and 67% were found to be malnourished. Our major focus is on the mother and child care program, which is an integration of health, nutrition and development that addresses the needs of pregnant women and children upto 5 years of age. It is a "continuum care" for the holistic development of child early before birth.

The pre-school programme runs on a health-based approach. Access to the mobile medical unit, periodic medical camps and follow-ups have helped raise awareness and eased accessibility of health services. For immediate response, health workers from the community have been trained every quarter and their capacities built to address health issues.

As part of the health project we have initiated a water and sanitation project as a requisite in providing good health to all.



Highlights

- Around 180 children were administered with polio drops.
- Catchup immunisation given to 38 children below the age of 10.
- For the first time, a special programme was organised in the village where 26 pregnant women registered for ante-natal care from the government.
- Improvement in the health seeking behaviour of tribal communities resulting in six women having institutional deliveries and new born babies registered for immunization.
- The district health department facilitated in issuing birth certificates for new born babies delivered in the Jawadhi Hills.
- Around 247 children were given de-worming tablets and awareness was created in the school
 and community on healthy living. All the school children now regularly wear footwear to school
 to protect themeselves from infections..
- The district health department distributes vitamin and iron supplements for adolescent girls.
- Micronutrient supplements were distributed to 78 lactating mothers and 42 pregnant women in the tribal villages.
- 2 child care centers (balwadis) were inaugurated with 71 children between 3-5 years for early child care and development.
- A hot nutritious meal is provided for all the 290 Seb's school children.167 children below 5 years are given noon meals and nutrition supplements.
- Periodic monitoring of height and weight measurments were taken for pre-school and Seb's school children.
- For the first time 38 water points were tested and issues with contamination are being addressed. Safe drinking water has been made available in 70 percent of our school communities.



LIVELIHOOD

In the tribal project areas, land, water, livestock and forest remain the main source of livelihood. Most families depend on seasonal agriculture and the forest as a source of income Over the years, the deteriorating forest and the implementation of forest protection laws have adversely impacted these activitites, resulting in decreased income for the local communities.

Interstate and intrastate migration of labour has become a common practice to earn a livelihood. Seasonal migration is a common phenomenon. In such situations, it has become crucial for the tribal population to diversify their avenues of income, which will provide livelihood opportunites outside traditional farming. Seb's has promoted home-based microenterprises such as poultry-rearing, soap-making, tailoring and Eco-trails.

The Goodbye to Paper project empowers destitute women to earn a living with dignity and self-confidence. This has enabled them to educate their children and aspire for a better life.



Highlights

- Two women's self-help groups from different villages produce soaps and their personal hygiene has improved with the use of soap.
- · Zaila soaps have been marketed across the country through TRIFED.
- Eggs from the poultry-rearing project are supplied to the schools for the noon meal, generating a steady income.
- The income of women in the sustainable livelihood program has substantially improved resulting in each member having a savings bank account and supporting their children through education.



Baby studied up to 9th standard, and then discontinued her education after her mother's death. Her father is handicapped. She became a rag-picker to earn a living and sustain her family. She was deserted by her husband and lived with no support. Seb's intervened and supported Baby to undergo three months of ironing training. She completed her training and now runs a successful ironing business.

DREAM PROJECT

'Dance to Reach Every Aim with the Magic in you!' This is the motto of the DREAM program. DREAM is a curriculum run in rural schools that offers exciting opportunities for students of all ages, enabling young people to develop their skills and confidence through computers, art and music.

Impact

- The DREAM project has impacted over 1350 students at King's School Kasam, the CSI Higher Secondary school at Arni and Senji Mottur primary school.
- A workshop held on stress management preparing Higher Secondary Students to face their public exams at Arni School helped achieve a 100% pass percentage in the board exams.
- Two bands with 20 students each were trained by a professional music teacher.
 Both the bands had the opportunity to perform at various public events in Vellore district.
- A photography workshop by CMAP trained children at King's School to explore self-portraiture using photography, pictures and text.
- House-mothers of MBKG Pannai orphanage had an exciting workshop on Rangoli and traditional Indian art. The art session brought colour to their lives!



HUMANITARIAN CLOWNS

The Humanitarian Clowns is a group of international volunteers who visit our districts to provide care to people in distress and promote local volunteers to get involved in social medicine. The method is to create a joyful atmosphere enhancing the well-being of individuals and groups. Seb's is honoured to partner with them in this project. A group of local Seb's volunteers have been involved in working with different communities damaged by poverty and ill health. This public health outreach program promotes healing and brings laughter to the injured spirit.

Impact

- More than 200 local vounteers are registered with the clowning programme.
- A new initiative, "Feed the Needy", distributed more than 3500 food packets to poor and homeless people.
- Volunteers actively participated in flood relief at Chennai and Cuddalore.



PARTNERSHIPS

The year 2015-16 helped Seb's Projects India consolidate its projects and also initiate new programs as a result of the new partnerships.

CHILD CARE CENTRE

The partnership with the **Integrated Child Development Department and Shishukunj** helped address the needs of another segment of the tribal population -the health and nutrition of children below the age of 4 and pregnant and lactating mothers through the Balwadis or child care centres.

HEALTH

Our new 4 wheel drive vehicle, presented by **Drs. Saramma and Ian Sargeant**, has transformed our work in the hills in terms of road acessibility and reach, particularly in improving health of the tribal communities.

The **District Health Department** and **Primary Health Department** at Odugathur further facilitated health care by initiating the immunization program in all our villages. They also promote ante-natal and post-natal care.

The CMC CHAD hospital have made health care a reality for tribal communities through monthly clinics held in different villages in the Jawadhi Hills and the support and care of very sick patients at the hospital premises in Bagayam.



LIVELIHOOD

Seb's Projects' partnership with the **District Forest Department** over the years has enabled us to focus and improve address various aspects of life of the tribal communities in the Jawadhi Hills. Their involvement in the setting up of the Eco Trail as a means of livelihood, as well as their continued participation in the programme, has made the Eco Trail a huge success.

TRIFED has supported, and continues to support, the Eco Trail by marketing the handmade soaps produced by the Thandayankottai self-help group. The MOUs'signed between Seb's Projects and Abdul Hakkim College of Engineering and GTECH College have further strengthened the Eco Trail- a sustainable livelihood program in Thandayankottai village.


EDUCATION

They helped me to understand the nature of his disease and my role in supporting him, particularly with his meals and medication.




It is a dream come true to have safe and clean drinking water within our village.
